I. M.A. PROGRAMME IN GANDHIAN THOUGHT

The Department of Gandhian Thought was established in 1979. The department offers P.G programme in Gandhian Thought and offers all academic support to Ph.D scholars in Gandhian Thought. The MA programme aims at holistic study of Gandhian Thought and philosophy. It involves systematic study of life and works of Gandhi, his economic, philosophical, political and social thoughts. The programme also focuses on practical implementation of these concepts and values and also their relevance at the national and global level in this ever evolving world.

The proposed post graduate course in Gandhian Thought is designed according to the guidelines provided under the New Education Policy, by the Government of India and the need to align the curriculum within the framework of the same. The objective is to make the curriculum more student friendly considering the aspects of flexibility and mobility.

Academically the course is designed to provide the understanding of the fundamental ideas, concepts and processes involved in the understanding of Gandhian Thought in general. The programme is designed to provide student an overall learning experience in theory as well as hands on experience in research, paper presentation, research project work and internship. The new credit curriculum framework for two years Post Graduate (PG) Programme in Gandhian Thought is designed vide Government of Maharashtra, Department of Higher and Technical Education Department G. R.No. NEP-22/CR No. 09/VISHI-3 shikshana dt. April 20, 2023, to be brought into effect from the academic year 2023-24.

II. OBJECTIVES AND PROGRAMME OUTCOME OF MA (GANDHIAN THOUGHT)

OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAMME

- 1) To expand the participant's world view in consonance with the life and work of M. Gandhi.
- 2) To train the minds with Gandhian values of Truth, Non-violence and love.
- 3) To visualize Gandhi's Ideal society based on mutual co-operation and aimed at peaceful coexistence.
- 4) To describe Gandhi's contribution for a better and harmonious world.
- 5) To put forth Gandhi's viewpoints and philosophy with reference to Swadeshi, Swaraj, Village Swaraj, Khadi, Village and Cottage Industries, Self Sufficiency, Cooperation, Co-operative Sector etc.
- 6) To encourage learners to consider Gandhian ideals of religious practices based on science and spirituality and devoid of orthodoxy and ritualism.

- 7) To familiarize the participants with Gandhi's organizational and management skills for making good future leaders.
- 8) To inspire and encourage research in the field of Gandhian philosophy and its relevance in current times and in future.

PROGRAMME OUTCOME

- Better understanding of life and work of Gandhi and his major contribution to Satyagraha, Independence Struggle in India and his understanding of individual and society.
- 2) Emulating Gandhian life style based on simplicity and limiting wants.
- 3) Understanding and execution of Constructive Programme toward making India a just nation.
 - 4) Learners acquiring life skills based on Gandhian principles by adopting environment supportive lifestyle and developing interest towards self less service.
 - 5) Better understanding in learners regarding conflict resolutions on Gandhian lines.

III. CREDIT AND COURSE DISTRIBUTION STRUCTURE

- 1. The M.A. programme is designed as Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) within the Credit Based Semester System (CBSS) vide Government of Maharashtra, Department of Higher and Technical Education Department G.R.No. NEP-22/CR No. 09/VISHI-3 shikshana dt. April 20, 2023, to be brought into effect from the academic year 2023-24.
- **2.** The new syllabus is designed as per the Semester Pattern with Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) Schema.
- **3.** The entire programme is full time, and of Two Academic years duration consisting of four semesters.
- **4.** The student will have to complete a total of 82 credits in the entire programme in four semesters which includes 20 credits each in Sem. I, Sem.II, Sem. III and 22 credits in Sem. IV.
- **6.** The Courses are divided into Mandatory, Electives, Research Methodology (RM), On Job Training (OJT), Field Project (FP), and Research Project (RP).
 - Mandatory courses are compulsory courses.
 - **Electives** are elective courses from which the students have the choice to select a course of their choice.
 - Research Methodology (RM) is a compulsory course the students have to undertake in the first semester.
 - On Job Training (OJT) is a credited course in which the student will have to choose between internship/apprenticeship and the Field Project.
 - **Research Project (RP)** is a credited course in third and fourth semester in which the student will have to conduct extensive research in the area of study and submit a research project.
 - 7. In each semester, there will be three major mandatory courses of 4 credits each.

- **8.** Out of the three elective courses in each semester, the student will have to select one elective course per semester which will be of 4 credits.
- **9.** In semester one, Research Methodology will also be a mandatory course.
- **10.** In semester two, apart from the mandatory and elective courses, the students will have to choose any one option between On Job training (OJT) and Field Project.
- 11. Internship or Field project in second semester will have to be completed during the summer vacation. The internship will be of 120 hours. The student will have to undertake the internship in the subsequent week after the completion of his/her theory examination. The internship must be completed within four to six weeks of its commencement.
- **12.** The students must confirm their internship with the letter of confirmation from the organization, two weeks before the end term examination.
- **13.** In semester three and four, apart from the mandatory and elective courses, every student has to undertake research Project (RP) which will be of four and six credits respectively.
- **14.** The examination system is based upon continuous internal evaluation and a written and descriptive examination with a 40/60 component. 40 Marks are allotted for internal and continuous evaluation and 60 marks for term end examination for 4 credit courses.
- **15.** The student will have to secure minimum 50 marks cumulatively for passing the course. The internal evaluations of 40marks are divided into class room activity, paper presentation, assignment, term paper, viva and mid-term examination. The respective teachers can also use other methods of evaluation like survey, report writing, book reviews, etc., as a part of internal evaluation.
- **16.** The term end examination of 60 Marks will be of descriptive nature conducted by the department at the end of the semester for courses have 4 credits.
- 17. The entire course will be of 2000 marks.

IV. PG DIPLOMA AND EXIT OPTION

A student will be eligible after a three-year UG degree for the award of a PG Diploma in Gandhian Thought after he has successfully earned 40 credits after completion of the first year PG including the first and the second semester.

This provision will come into effect only after the notification of the university to adopt the 1-year PG diploma programme.

Similarly, the student will be eligible for One year- two semester PG degree after the completion of 40 credits after the four-year UG degree. The student with four-year UG degree will be directly admitted to the second year PG programme. This provision too will come into effect after the notification of the university for the same.

V. ELIGIBILITY

1. Admission and Promotion:

- 1. Students who have passed a degree course in any discipline from a UGC recognized statutory University/ Institute in India or Abroad are eligible for admission in the 1st Semester.
- 2. For admission to III semester, the student must have earned 60% of the total credits (rounded off to nearest lower integer) in the immediate last year (i.e., I and II semester put together) failing which he/she shall not be eligible for admission to III semester.
- 3. The eligibility will however be subject to the fulfillment of other eligibility conditions and rules of admission laid down by the RTM Nagpur University as in force.
- 4. The programme is open for regular, full time students only.

- 5. The One-year PG Diploma at the end of the first year of the PG course with an exit option for the students who have completed 3 years UG programme will come into effect as per the notification of the university.
- 6. Similarly, admission to second year M.A. programme for four years UG passed students will also come into effect as per the notification of the university.
- 7. Rest of the eligibility criteria will be governed by various rules, ordinances, etc., issued by the university from time to time.

VI. DATE OF COMMENCEMENT AND ACADEMIC YEAR

- 1. Two consecutive (one odd+ one even) semesters constitutes one Academic year.
- 2. New syllabus will come into force from the academic year 2023-24 for M.A. Semesters I and II.

VII. INCENTIVE CREDITS (AS PER UNIVERSITY DIRECTION NO. 15 OF 2023):

VIII. PATTERN OF EVALUATION, EXAMINATION AND QUESTION PAPER

Students will be evaluated in the following manner.

A. Written Examination

- 1. There will be written examination of descriptive type for each course at the end of every semester.
- 2. Each Course of 4 credits will be having an examination of 60 marks of 3-hours duration.
- **3**. For 4 Credit courses written examination , the question paper will consist of first four Long answer questions with internal choices, from each of the four units. The fifth question will have equal content from all units. Students will have to answer all the five questions. Each question will carry 12 marks.
- **4.** Evaluation of OJT will be made out of 100 marks on the basis of internship certificate received on completion of minimum 120 hours, written report submitted to the department of

the same, presentation of the report and viva-voce. The internship certificate along with the written report will carry 60% weightage and presentation and viva-voce will carry 40% weightage. Internship will be completed during the summer vacation and will commence one week subsequently ending the semester end examination within 4 to 6 weeks.

5. Evaluation of the field project will be made out of 100 marks on the basis of field survey carried out, submission of report, presentation of the report and viva-voce. The field survey and report submission will carry 60% weightage and presentation and viva-voce will carry 40% weightage.

The field project will be based upon the following criteria.

- a. Chapter outlining the introduction to the research problem, aim and objects of the research, research questions, methodology and literature survey of at least 10 books and journal articles.
- b. Field survey findings and analysis.
- c. Conclusion and recommendations if any.
- d. Detailed list of references and final bibliography.
- e. Schedules including questionnaire, and other reference documents related to the study.
- **6**. Evaluation of Research Project will be made out of 100 marks in the third semester and the 4th semester.
- 7. In the third semester the candidate will be evaluated out of 100 Marks on the basis of research proposal submitted to the department, presentation of the proposal and viva-voce. The research proposal will carry 60% weightage and presentation and viva-voce will carry 40% weightage. The research proposal will be based upon the following criteria:
- a. formulation of problem, aim and objectives and research questions
- b. literature survey of at least 10 books or journal articles.
- c. pilot survey and formulation of the questionnaire if it is a field project.
- d. collection of secondary data if it is a library-based project.
- e. Formulation of a methodology.
- f. Tentative bibliography.
- **8**. In the fourth semester the candidate will be evaluated out of 100 marks on the basis of Research project report submitted to the department, presentation and viva-voce. The Research Project Report will carry 60% weightage (60 Marks) and presentation and viva-voce will carry 40% weightage (40 Marks). **The research project report will be submitted taking into consideration the following criteria.**
- a. Chapter outlining the introduction to the research problem, aim and objects of the research, research questions, methodology and literature survey of at least 15 books and journal articles. b. Field survey findings and analysis if it is a field survey.
- c. Secondary data analysis if it is a library survey.
- d. Conclusion and recommendation if any
- e. Detailed list of references and final bibliography.
- f. Schedules including questionnaire, and other reference document related to the study.

B. Internal Evaluation

- 1. There will be internal evaluation of each student in each Course.
- 2. Internal evaluation will be of 40 Marks for four credited courses. It will include assignments, paper presentation, book reviews, survey, project, study tour, class room participation, viva-voce, mid term examination etc.)
- 3. The teacher concerned will decide the task to be given to the students and will also evaluate the performance of the student.
- 4. There will be a mid-term examination covering at least 40% of the syllabus of 20 marks. The midterm examination can be conducted as descriptive or in an objective (multiple choice questions) form.
- 5. Viva will be conducted jointly by the faculty of the department or teachers concerned.

6. The evaluation of the field project and research project will be made internally by the teacher in charge and presentation will be evaluated by at least two teachers including the internal evaluator.

C. Minimum Standard of Passing (R17.1)

- 1. The minimum standard of passing is 50% cumulatively i.e., internal evaluation and term end exam taken together for theory papers and submission of certificate, written report and viva-voce where ever applicable.
- 2. A student is compulsorily required to be present in internal evaluation and semester end examination.
